# JEWISH CEMETERY EXPANDED - Pre Sale Visits Sunday March 10



#### Congregation Emeth now exclusive managers of the Jewish Section!

Habing Funeral Home and Congregation Emeth entered into an agreement recently which resulted in the Jewish section of Gavilan Hills Cemetery now being under the temple's management. Congregation Emeth is now the exclusive contact for anyone wishing to buy a plot in the Jewish section. As a consequence, we are now able to offer a substantial purchasing discount to members, especially to those who buy their plots anytime from March 10 through April 23, 2013 when an even greater pre-sale will take place. This 45-day significant presale price is only available to members, who will also have first choice in designating

their burial sites. On April 24, a special non-member sale will be offered to the Jewish communities throughout South Valley and Silicon Valley so we encourage interested members to act quickly.

Given the extremely high rates for plots at some of the Silicon Valley Jewish Cemeteries, our goal was to offer members a chance to purchase plots for considerably less money. The member rate is based on taking the non-member rate (approx. 30% below one other area cemetery) and reducing an additional \$700-\$1000 (single/double grave options). During the presale, we will be offering an additional 15% discount to

members up and above the discounts listed above. Final pricing is being determined, but Single/Double Plots with Flat Markers will be approximately \$3415/ \$5060 respectively or \$5175/\$7695 for those selecting an Upright Marker. Prices will increase to approximately \$4140/\$6125 (Flat) and \$6205/\$9225 (Upright) after the sale so please do not miss out on this one time opportunity. Prices for non-members increase an additional \$700/\$100 (single / double grave). Concrete liners will also be made available at \$975 + applicable tax if purchased at time of plot purchase. Endowment care is currently a one-time \$400 fee, and Internment fees are \$890. When all burial related expenses are considered, the current offer represents a 42% reduction off fees paid at one other area cemetery and a 24% reduction off the fees paid at a different area cemetery which also only allows for double graves and flat mark-

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ers.

# A Message from Rabbi Israel



Throughout our Passover seder, we are reminded: "Once we were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt, but God brought us out from there with a strong hand and an outstretched arm. If the Holy One, blessed be God, had not taken our ancestors out of Egypt, then we, our children, and our grandchildren, would still be enslaved to Pharaoh in Egypt."

This is the enduring message of the seder: Once we were slaves and now we are free.

Shortly after experiencing our freedom, we received the Ten Commandments at the foot of Mount Sinai. This was followed by the laws and ordinances that we agreed to obey, the rules for living that are contained in the Torah. First on that list are the laws detailing treatment of slaves. How peculiar! Because we were slaves, one would expect the law to be precise and simple: No slaves!

As hard as it is for us moderns to read this, Torah is not referring to the kind of treatment that we received in Egypt – a condition of cruel, permanent bondage which is clearly unacceptable. The slavery legislated in Torah is dealing with people who find themselves unable to take care of themselves and so they sell their labor for a specific time. Eventually, slavery was abolished altogether. But in the early years of freedom, becoming a slave was an accepted way to repay a debt or overcome bankruptcy.

Unique to Torah is the expectation that slavery would be short lived. The core teaching is how the slave becomes free. The slave would work for six years and in the seventh year, the slave could go free. No payment is given to the master; the slave earned the right to be free. Torah insists on decent treatment and in fact considers slaves to be virtually members of the slave owner's family. At the end of the proscribed time if the slave chooses not to go free, this is permitted according to a specific procedure.

Later, during the time of the Rabbinic Period, the Rabbis taught that the words, "he fares well with you" (Deuteronomy 15:16) specify that the Hebrew servant had to be "with" — that is, equal to — the master in food and drink. The owner couldn't eat quality food while the servant was fed poor quality. The master couldn't sleep on a feather bed while the servant slept on straw. In addition, the master had to

support the servant's wife and children until the servant was released.

On Pesach, the holiday of freedom, we are taught that we must remember when WE were slaves. The memory is not for nostalgia – it is meant to teach us lessons that are eternal. One lesson, of course, is gratitude to the Holy One for the blessing of freedom. But another perhaps more pressing lesson is that we cannot tolerate oppression. We cannot become too lazy to take action when we see the stranger mistreated. We cannot tolerate a world that still enslaves people. We cannot accept inequality and injustice as normal.

"Avadim hayenu. Atah b'nei chorim. Once we were slaves. Now we are free."


Dear Families and Friends of Congregation Emeth,

These changes included revamping the curriculum for our Hebrew and Religious Schools, changing the format of our now WEEKLY Shabbat Services to meet the varied needs of our congregation, retrofitting the social hall to accommodate larger groups, and most recently expanding and improving the Jewish Cemetery in Gilroy. Our youth group is more active than ever and attendance at services has been wonderful. It has also been exciting to see families sharing Shabbat dinners together prior to services at Emeth. We have an amazing group of families and interacting with each other is part of what strengthens the bonds with Emeth. We encourage everyone to participate at the various events and activities Emeth has to offer

Our newest goal of the board focuses around the area of succession planning. #### A GUIDE TO OUR FRIDAY NIGHT SERVICES

Last year, Congregation Emeth began offering different formats for our Erev Shabbat Services in order to appeal to the needs of our growing membership. The formats have evolved to best serve our congregants. All Friday evening services begin at 7:15 PM and all include Mourner's Kaddish and Prayers for Healing. Here's a brief description of our formats:



#### **SHABBAT SHORT 'N SWEET - SSS**

Usually held on the first and third Shabbats of the month, this service follows a community Shabbat dinner, sponsored by the Religious School. The dinner begins at 6:30 PM, after the completion of Religious School. Religious School students and their families are expected to attend this service and the entire congregation is also welcome and encouraged to attend. The service is Rabbi-led, with explanations of prayers and the Torah reading of the week. Students participate in leading the service. Adults as well as children enjoy the relaxed style and the interaction between participants and the Rabbi.

#### FRIDAY NIGHT LIVE - FNL

Usually held on the second Shabbat of the month, the primary focus of this service is experiencing the joy of Shabbat through music, led by the Rabbi and a cantorial soloist. The format has changed in 2013. The service expanded to a 1½ hour format. In addition to our songbook, we use our *siddur* (prayer book) and include both the *Kabbalat Shabbat* (introductory psalms) and the Friday evening service. Sometimes Rabbi Israel leads a discussion, sometimes there is a *D'var Torah* (words of Torah, a sermon), and other times she chants the *Haftarah*, from the Book of Prophets. An *Oneg Shabbat* (joy of Shabbat) dessert table follows the service.

#### **TORAH 'N T'FILA - TNT**

Usually held on the fourth Shabbat of the month, this is a complete *Erev Shabbat* (Friday night) service. Led by the Rabbi and a cantorial soloist, this service includes a Torah Service and a *D'var Torah*. An *Oneg Shabbat* (joy of Shabbat) dessert table follows the service.

#### **SHABBAT HOSTS**

Religious School parents rotate hosting the community Shabbat dinners. FNL and TNT are hosted by other volunteers in the community, again on a rotating basis. If you have not yet volunteered to host one evening, please contact admin@emeth.net and volunteer. The hospitality we offer is part of what makes Congregation Emeth unique and everyone looks forward to socializing at the end of services. Your volunteering is essential and appreciated.

#### **MEALS BEFORE SERVICES**

SSS services are preceded by the community dinners—the FNL and TNT services have a dessert table at the end of services instead of dinner before. However, all members are most welcome to bring a picnic dinner for your family to eat in the social hall between Religious School and Services. If you would like to participate in Shabbat rituals (optional of course), we will gladly provide candles and wine/grape juice.

### AMAZING YOUTH GROUP ADVENTURE

Emeth Dor Kef (EDK – "Emeth's fun generation") recently returned from an amazing trip to Los Angeles, held over MLK weekend in January.

Starting off with a six hour car ride does not seem ideal, but it turned out to be a great way to bond. The weekend was jam packed with activities! From going to Disneyland, to ending with the Museum of Tolerance (with a whole bunch of trivia in between). The weekend was filled with excitement from the start to end.

Our Rabbi Debbie Israel and Rabbi Jay Sherwood (from Rancho Cucamonga) did a remarkable job incorporating Jewish activities that normally would not be all that exciting, and turning them into interesting learning experiences and fun activities. For instance, when we went to visit the Mount Sinai Jewish cemetery, one would not think that would be "a trip of a lifetime" but it happened to be a major highlight of the weekend. Viewing the massive mosaic filled with Jewish history was moving. The mosaic incorporated famous leaders and movements that have helped the Jewish people throughout time. This one "picture" had so much history underneath the surface and told a story that none of us has ever seen before. In the same cemetery, we went to view a replica of the zodiac symbols that were found in a ruined temple from previous centuries. We went into critical thinking of why a mosaic of zodiac signs would be on the floor of a temple, and it shows the cultural influence during the time.

Another experience that was unlike any other, happened to take place at one of the few rest spots we visitied. Two of the three days of the trip, we went to Jewish restaurants in the Pico-Robertson area, a section of Los Angeles that was filled with Jewish residents. After we finished eating our falafel wraps and kosher burgers, we had some time to explore this strip of Judaism. All eight of us teens walked together down the street. First, we went into a Jewish market that happened to be the first Jewish one many of had been to. The store featured food like "alef-bet cookies" and even ice cream containers were labeled in Hebrew! After that we crossed the street and checked out "The Mitzvah Store" which Rabbi Israel recommended to us. This store carried a wide selection of kippot (headcoverings) and interesting books about Judaism. The experience in that store, though, was more than the books. One of the workers in the store saw us come in and instantly greeted us with a smile. He saw that we were looking at some books and started talking to us about great ones that we all should read. All eight of us started having a conversation with this man about how it is sometimes hard being Jewish, especially in an environment where not everyone around you is the same. He understood, and in that store, I do not think I have ever before felt a sense of belonging and community so big and so open hearted. He continued talking to us and we did not want to leave, but by the time we had to walk back across the street to meet with the two Rabbis, I had felt something I had never truly felt before. I gained a whole new level of pride in my roots and of being Jewish. The community that we were placed into was not shy and was ever welcoming, and I am positive that this short trip will forever remain in all of our hearts.

This weekend trip to Los Angeles was more than a getaway and visit to Disney Land; it was an experience. The Emet Dor Kef youth group bonded more than ever before, and a new sense of Jewish pride was unleashed in all of us. I cannot thank Rabbi Israel and Rabbi Sherwood enough for taking us on this wonderful trip, and all of the parents for letting us go!

We are also so grateful to the Emeth adults who supported the trip, including: the women who sponsored the mahjong tournament and donated the proceeds to us; Brigit Strongin who sponsored a jewelry sale and donated the profits to us, as well as everyone who bought jewelry from her; everyone who participated in the Chili's Restaurant fundraiser; and those who made individual donations to the Youth Group fund. # **Jewish Cemetery Expanded**



"It began with inserting a physical boundary and a fence around the Jewish section in keeping with Jewish tradition, under the direction of Rabbi Debbie Israel and Michael Oshan. Then, the area was recently expanded to three times the original size, grass was planted and trees were moved. The Holocaust Memorial was also relocated to a more appropriate area in our section."

Pre-selecting plots and purchasing them in advance is a gift one gives to one's survivors. Congregation Emeth benefits from the purchases as well, thanks to the goodwill of Habing Funeral Home. In exchange, our Rabbi and the cemetery committee regularly check the site to be certain standards are maintained, in addition to the rights of membership during a time of loss of loved ones. Congregation Emeth has invested significant time and money into the expansion and beautification of the Jewish Cemetery and believe that it now represents a space of which we can be proud.

### "Let All Who Are Hungry, Come and Eat."

This year Passover is a little early – the first Seder is on Monday March 25<sup>th</sup> and the second on Tuesday March 26<sup>th</sup>.
