

Religious Action Center Take Action: Tell Governor Brown to Sign Racial Profiling Bill

Join Reform Jews from across California acting for racial justice during the High Holy Days. Call Governor Jerry Brown and urge him to sign AB 953, the racial profiling bill which recently passed in the legislature.



African Americans and Latinos are disproportionally more likely to be detained, arrested, charged with a crime, imprisoned, and killed by police than whites. The Talmud teaches us that God created humankind from one human being so that no person can say, "My ancestor is greater than yours." We are taught in Pirkei Avot that "your friend's dignity should be as dear to you as your own." Jewish tradition compels us to speak out against biased policing. AB 953 will enhance transparency and accountability, mend trust in law enforcement, and improve public safety. CHAI SCHOOL - A CLASSROOM COMMUNITY

At Emeth, we've created a community where students look forward to Religious School, a community where students learn from classmates and teachers they consider friends, and a community where students are eager to learn about themselves and their shared and unique Jewish heritage.

This year, I will be teaching the entire Chai School as one combined class with **Kelsey Valentine** and **Hana Cidon**. Kelsey taught Gesher last year, and will continue to teach activities during Choice Time this year. Hana is an experienced Yavneh teacher. She will be teaching art, music, and/or dance during Choice Time. Together, we will offer the students a variety of diverse learning opportunities.

Each month we will study specific prayers or songs, Jewish holidays, concepts, and mitzvot. Other topics, like Shabbat songs and the blessings for food, holidays, and occasions, have been and will remain part of our classroom rituals and routines. Three new topics will be introduced this year: Mussar, the weekly parsha (Torah portion), and a monthly focus on specific prayers.

Mussar, which Alan Morinis calls, "a treasure house of practical wisdom and guidance for inner living that has been built up in the Jewish world over the past millennium," is a wonderful path to living Jewishly. Just as performing mitzvot helps us to make the outside world a better place, focusing on middot, the "soul traits" of Mussar, provides us with a practice to make ourselves happier and healthier on the inside. Each month we will focus on a different middah.

Understanding the stories within our Torah, and connecting them to our own lives, is another path toward living a Jewish life. Each class session, I will provide the students with an introduction to the weekly parsha, often through the short animated videos from G-dcast (http://www.g-dcast.com/video/). We will discuss the passages, and work to develop a greater understanding of each week's portion through small group discussions, projects, and performances—as age and interest level permits.

Monthly prayers, or songs, will be taught in a similar scaffolded fashion. The entire Chai School will learn the

opening lines or chorus, and individual students will progress on to learning the entire prayer and/or reading it in Hebrew, as age and interests indicate. The prayers and songs are from our Siddur. I will teach them using our Emeth melodies.

Due to the nature of our expanded class, the students will have a choice of learning activities for each topic this year. Class sessions will include both a quiet and an active activity. Quiet activities could include journaling, reading, crafting, and independent art projects. Active activities could include group games, building projects, gardening, cooking, dance, exercise, and music. This workshop format will allow me to meet the needs of each student and each age group while challenging and supporting students as individuals within the larger group setting. The beauty of our curriculum, teaching students how to create their own Jewish lives, is that all of our children will be exposed to the appropriate understandings and practices for their age and interest levels, while simultaneously benefiting from the greater classroom community and friendship network that our expanded Chai School classroom provides. All students will have the opportunity to learn and engage at their own pace and in their own preferred fashion. And, each student will have the opportunity to make friends across grade levels, effectively turning Chai School into one large, close-knit community.

Our syllabus also includes several field trips, kitchen adventures, and guest speakers. The students always love field trips, kitchen adventures, and buddy activities, so we're excited to welcome adult congregants into our classroom as special buddies this year. Each connection the students make with these caring adults helps the children imagine their own "grown-up" Jewish lives and brings the entire Emeth community closer. Please let me know if you, or someone you know, could enrich our classroom discussions with a special presentation or activity.

Editor's note: Chai School is Emeth's lower school, consisting of all students younger than the B'nai Mitzvah class. The B'nai Mitzvah class is taught by Rabbi Israel. Emeth also offers Hebrew school, as well as Emet Dor Kef for teens.

MEET OUR CHAI SCHOOL STAFF

MariaElena Jarson - Head Teacher - I have taught kindergarten through eighth grade at Montessori, Jewish Day, and public schools. I taught Torah for Tots at Congregation Sinai and have been teaching in the Beit Sefer for the past three years. I have a degree in literature from UCSC and received my teaching credential and a Master's in Education at UCSD.

I enjoy the students' enthusiasm for their Jewish friendships and studies, and look forward to including the entire school in our classroom community. I appreciate our new format and expanded classroom because it will allow for more student choice and individual expression, encourage multi-age friendships, and establish a continuous progression through the Chai School curriculum.

Hana Cidon - For more than 45 years, I have had the pleasure and the honor of teaching several generations of kindergarten age children. I have seen kindergartens evolve dramatically from glorified daycare services to structured curriculum based programs. My personal experience, education, observation and reflection have led to my own philosophy on kindergarten.

I believe that every child deserves the opportunity to grow and develop to full potential. When children are happy and feel good about themselves, those children will try to do their best. I take the time to get to know each child in our Gan individually. I strive to understand his/her needs. My students know that I respect and care about them. Each day, I work to help them feel secure and happy. I encourage my students to talk about their own feelings, to learn to respect the ideas and feelings of others and to take responsibility for their own behavior.

I advocate my students to be a mensch, a person with integrity and honor. Critical thinking and problem solving are a natural part of our daily schedule. The children are learning to become independent in handling personal needs, caring for their classroom materials and follow routines.

I strongly believe that for a person to develop a strong Jewish identity, he/she must receive daily exposure from an early age. My experience as an Israeli/American/Jewish parent has shown me that it is not enough to teach your children at home about their Jewish identity. It is not enough to celebrate Jewish holidays or talk about Judaism in order to instill in your child a love and appreciation for who they are. You need to make sure that your child is immersed early on in all kinds of Jewish activities at home and in the wider Jewish community.

Yigal and I have four children and four grandchildren. Besides spending time with my husband, I enjoy creating earrings and working in our garden.

I'm very excited to join the Chai School. When we came to California in 1997, I taught Hebrew in Emeth Hebrew school for four years. I always wanted to continue and now that I'm semi-retired I'm happy to be part of the school. I don't know yet what will be my role in Chai School but it has to do with music. I play the accordion and I love teaching Israeli dancing.

Kelsey Valentine - This will be my second year teaching at Chai School and I can't wait for all the good times we will have this year as students continue to learn about their religion! Last year one of my favorite parts of teaching was seeing how excited students would get about topics or projects. This will be an exciting activity as it will allow students to have fun outside as well as enjoy and share the produce that will hopefully be grown! I can't wait to help the students out on creating this new project.

Remembering Lauren Jenkins

Lauren Jenkins passed away Monday, September 14. We will miss her warmth, her intellect, her bubbly personality, her sense of humor, and her positive outlook. She leaves behind a legacy of caring and giving, both at Emeth and in the broader community.

Professionally, Lauren was regional director at Kaiser's clinical genetics lab. She loved sharing her excitement about science, lecturing about DNA, for example, at both San Jose State University and Tech Trek, an AAUW (American Association of University Women) science camp for girls.

A gifted educator, Lauren believed in hands-on learning. At Emeth she served as Education Chair and later as a Religious School teacher. She also created Emeth's library, donating many of her own books. Lauren was passionate about science education and, particularly, girls' engagement in math and science. When her children were young, she volunteered in the classroom as a science teacher, ran a summer science camp from her home, and taught science at Country Day School (now Oakwood) and Yavneh. An active member of AAUW, Lauren was Tech Trek coordinator for many years and also founded GEMS (Girls Engaged in Math and Science), a club for teenage girls. Lauren's passion for learning was felt by the many students whose lives she touched.

Lauren left us on Rosh HaShanah. Our new Rosh HaShanah machzor instructs us, "... The way we act, the way we speak, the way we meet G-d's image in ourselves and in others—these things have great power to make our lives matter. Therefore, ... let dreams give birth to justice and goodness." Lauren's life was a testament to these instructions; in her too short life; her actions spread justice and goodness to countless others.

Lauren leaves behind her loving family: husband John Jenkins, children Joelle and Zachary, parents Bette and Gerald Sallus, and brother Marc Sallus (Dev Cohen and sons Micah and Ari).

Mussar is a path of contemplative practices and exercises that have evolved over the past thousand years to help an individual soul to pinpoint and then to break through the barriers that surround it and obstruct the flow of inner light in our lives. Mussar is a treasury of techniques and understandings that offers immensely valuable guidance for the journey of our



lives...The human reality that Mussar addresses is actually universal, and the gifts it offers can be used by all people. As a spiritual practice, Mussar originated in the 10th century and evolved into a social/spiritual movement, inspired by the leadership of Rabbi Israel Salanter. Ongoing – Thursdays, 11:00-12:30 PM. Now in its second year, this group is now "closed" as an advanced group. Demonstrating the success in Mussar's ability to help participants develop certain values (patience, equanimity, gratitude, awe to name a few) and find balance in their lives, the group requested to continue a second year.

LEARN YIDDISH

Cost is \$200 for Emeth members or \$250 for non-members. The textbook is approximate \$30 in addition. Yiddish was at one time the international language of Ashkenazic Jews (the Jews of Central and Eastern Europe and their descendants). A hybrid of Hebrew and medieval German, Yiddish takes about three-quarters of its vocabulary from German, but borrows words liberally from Hebrew and many other languages from the lands where Ashkenazic Jews have lived. It has a grammatical structure all of its own, and is written in an alphabet based on Hebrew characters.

Yiddish developed enormously rich literature, theater and music. A resurgence of the language is evident on college campuses such as UCLA, The Ohio State University as well as Stanford and UC Santa Cruz.
