No More Mortgage!

This spring, just 10 years after Congregation Emeth made the gigantic financial leap of purchasing our first spiritual home, I am delighted to announce that we have fully paid off our mortgage! All remaining financing is through bonds from our members (23 member households). This remaining debt represents less than 50% of the value of the building. (In contrast, at the time of purchase, we needed to finance 89% of the building cost.)

We have reached this milestone through a combination of specific financial strategies and member generosity:

- 1. Our initial financing included a commercial mortgage (\$359,000) from Pinnacle Bank and 5-year bonds (\$580,000) issued by Congregation Emeth. The board chose to issue bonds as a win-win opportunity: Our members could invest in Emeth and receive a good return on that investment, while the bond rate was lower than that of additional mortgage debt.
- 2. In addition to making regular mortgage payments, the board chose to direct tenant income (e.g. from church and kitchen renters) to pay down the mortgage, rather than spending it as part of the annual operating budget.
- 3. When the first 5-year issue of bonds matured, we successfully provided the opportunity for additional investors, enabling us to increase the bond amount, shifting the debt from the bank mortgage to member investors. At that time, several bondholders also made generous donations by canceling their bond debt.
- 4. Our recent, successful capital campaign raised funds specifically directed to further reduction of the mortgage, enabling us to pay our mortgage down by an additional \$48,000.
- 5. With the maturing of our second 5-year bond issue, some bondholders forgave additional existing bond debt and more members subscribed to our third bond release. A generous challenge gift by Emeth members encouraged these new subscriptions and was successfully triggered by reaching a target bond subscription level. These additional donations and bond subscriptions enabled us to fully pay off the mortgage.

The board sincerely thanks all past, new, and continuing bondholders and those making generous donations toward Congregation Emeth's ownership of our temple.

In addition, Susan was a founding member of Emeth Sisterhood, has been Chair of the Capital Campaign Committee, and was Chair of the Bimah Committee. She has served on the Emeth Board of Directors as President Elect, President, Past President, and most recently Chair of the Tikkun Olam Committee. In this role, Susan became the Founding Director of the Interfaith CommUNITY of South County.

Every Christmas Day you will find Susan, aka Santa's Elf, assisting Santa with the gift giving after preparing Christmas dinner at St. Joseph's. Six years ago Susan began chairing the annual Mah Jongg tournament, which donates funds raised back to the Emeth community.

Susan is personally engaged with Emeth as well. She was one of five women who studied together and celebrated their B'not Mitzvah, and she continues to participate in Rabbi Israel's adult education classes. You can regularly find Susan at a Shabbat service.

This award is becoming a very important tradition. It not only respects the people who give so much of themselves to our Jewish community, but also helps others know what can be done and what makes our community so vibrant.










Membership News

TORAH LISHMAH -- STUDY FOR ITS OWN SAKE!

Rabbi Barry W. Holtz wrote: Studying is the essence of being a Jew. It defines who one is. Hence, Jewish learning is not only the instrumental gaining of skills, knowledge and competencies. It is the religious act par excellence. Religious education is not only a preparation for what will come later; it is being a Jew, realizing one's Jewishness, in the very act of studying. (Textual Knowledge—Teaching the Bible in Theory and Practice)

In July, I will have the opportunity to attend the Hartman Rabbinic Scholars Program in Jerusalem during my vacation. I've wanted to participate in this program for so many years

but it seemed there was always an obstacle. This summer, I have shoved the obstacles aside and will be participating in this almost two-week seminar, studying with about 150 Rabbis from around the world. Our teachers are renown scholars. A dream realized!

In May Congregation Emeth completed our Chai and Hebrew School year, and four students graduated from its program. Hopefully these young people will continue their informal Jewish education through Emeth's prize program, Emet Dor Kef (EDK) for teens. We also celebrated with eight teenagers as they became confirmands. Our 15 Adult Jewish Education students completed their study of *Pirke Avot* (Ethics of our Sages) and *Mussar* (ethical behavior values). And our second adult B'not Mitzvah class has begun! A lot of teaching and a lot of learning, fulfilling our responsibility to not only teach our children but also *Torah Lishmah*, study Torah for it's own sake.
