BUILDING IMPROVEMENT PLANS

Recently the Emeth Board offered to match any increase offered over prior years' membership payments. The generosity of our congregation was on full display as we raised over \$5000 additional dollars this year. So most importantly, thank you for responding to our request!

Our first goal for this funding was to continue a focus on the security of our temple. We now have a comprehensive video surveillance system (which the Morgan Hill Police Department described as one of the best they've seen in a facility such as ours) and have enhanced the alarm systems of the building.

The next incremental security step that we are investigating is to further harden the entrance doors. While it might be enjoyable to spend the matching contribution dollars on more visible projects, the Board believes that a focus on temple security is a prudent use of our funds.

This winter, you may have stumbled over buckets catching rainwater as the drips fell from our old, dysfunctional roof. That's our next, necessary, target for spending. Repairing the roof (using funds raised through our recent capital campaign) is not a simple thing, because the root cause of the leaks is actually a failing heating/air conditioning (HVAC)

unit on the roof. We are planning a

project to replace the old, inefficient, HVAC unit entirely and get it off the roof where it causes these

leaks. We are exploring how to fund this: HVAC systems are very expensive and the matching contribution program will help but not totally cover these costs. Once we settle on a financial approach for this project, you'll see work over the next few months to put in a much, much more efficient unit (which will save on our gas and electric bills as well as improve the comfort of the building), and, when that unit is off the roof, we'll be able to properly fix the roof and no longer have our annual battle of getting the drop cloths and buckets in the right places to catch the rain falling inside the building.

Security systems, doors, roofs, air conditioners... none of these are glamorous projects. But they need to proceed and, with your generosity, we are making progress. Once in place, they ideally will never even be noticed. Meanwhile, be assured that other investments do continue, and hopefully, you see the wide variety of activities of our temple and appreciate the richness of our religious services, education programs, and more.

Where Can God Be Found?

"I experience God most when I..." Fill in the blank.

When I ask this question, the answer usually concerns nature – "I experience God when I see a beautiful sunrise...a rainbow after a storm ...looking at the ocean...being with my dog/cat/horse..."

For me, I experience the Holy One most intensely when I am in the sanctuary, when I've been successful in clearing my mind from distractions, and am present to the prayers in my heart without the background noise of my mind's chatter.

Recently, I had the mystical opportunity to experience God's presence both in the sanctuary and in nature, an unforgettable moment I'd like to share with you.

In January, my husband, Jerry, and I took a cruise around New Zealand—it's summer there, so it was a perfect time and place. It was a long cruise–14 days—and included two Shabbats. On most cruise ships, a room for a Friday evening service is provided, along with Manischevitz wine, prayer books, and challot. This cruise was no exception.

The first Friday night, around 35 people attended. We all sat in our seats, chatting and getting to know one another, while we waited for a volunteer to lead services. My father, of blessed memory, took many cruises and always led the services with great pride. I assumed this would be as meaningful to another traveler as it was with him so I encouraged people to lead. When it became obvious no one would, I stood up and began, not identifying myself as a Rabbi. When I threw in a d'var Torah, some people figured it out. When they saw me on board in the following days, always wearing a kippah, they wondered. To those with whom I chatted and became friendly in subsequent days, I "confessed."



The second Friday was a special day on the cruise. We would be cruising into three fjords. (A fjord is "a long, narrow, deep inlet of the sea between high cliffs, typically formed by submergence of a glaciated valley.") In New Zealand, there are three fjords. The excitement and beauty builds with each fjord, the third being the largest and most majestic. We were scheduled to enter the last one at 4 pm and complete the adventure at 6 pm. Friday evening services were scheduled to begin at 5. I was certain no one but Jerry and I would be there. Everyone would be strategically located elsewhere on the ship to see the massive view.

In fact, I grudgingly pulled myself away around 4:45, going to my room to change for Shabbat and arriving a few minutes after 5; I was late. Imagine my surprise to find the room overflowing with "congregants"! Jerry and I were the last to arrive! Everyone sat politely in their seats, waiting for services to begin.

So I stood in front of the congregation, told them who I was, and began the service. Now on one side of the room was a massive picture window and that was the side of the fjord where the largest waterfall was visible. The Torah reading that week included the giving of the Torah on Mt Sinai. I asked them to experience the power and awe of standing in front of the Mountain, seeing the fire and smoke on top as described in Torah. They looked out the window, to the high cliff alongside us, to the low-lying clouds covering the top and appearing like smoke, and we realized we didn't have to use our imagination. The powerful scene provided the visuals.



And that's the moment I experienced God's presence, both in the ship's temporary sanctuary and in nature. The response of my fellow travelers reminded me of the awesome responsibility of my work, to bring God into the room, into your lives. That moment filled me with such joy and at the same time I recognized that I was ready to return to you, to continue fulfilling my calling as spiritual leader. May it always be so.

Sunday, November 25, I had the great opportunity to represent Congregation Emeth and stand in for Rabbi Israel at the United Methodist Church's Interfaith Sunday. Following the previous week's Interfaith Thanksgiving, UMC had their own Interfaith Sunday in which they invited members of other religions to share in their call to worship and to share a verse from their holy books.

Pastor Patrick Davis warmly called me to their bimah to share some of our prayers. I read and explained the Sh'ma as our central prayer that affirms our allegiance to the one God. Then I read the Shehecheyanu and explained that it is a prayer for firsts and momentous occasions and called out the joyous occasion of this event.

Later in the service I was asked to share a verse from Torah on love or peace. I chose one that is particularly resonant to me in these times and I felt would also resonate with the gathered congregants. Leviticus 19:33-34.

"And if a stranger sojourn with thee in your land, ye shall not do him wrong. The stranger that sojourneth with you shall be unto you as the home-born among you, and thou shalt love him as thyself; for ye were strangers in the land of Egypt."

Also participating were Iman Ilyas from the South County Islamic Community, members of the Buddhist Temple and Pastor Patrick, who shared their scriptures and a call to worship. Finally, Dan Hazen of UMC shared a powerful document on the importance of Interfaith dialog. We were also blessed with a talk from guest speaker, Sai Prasad on his work in struggling communities in India and the Middle East.

As a member of the board of the Interfaith Community of South County and as a member of Congregation Emeth, I found this to be a meaningful and moving experience. I invite each of you to get involved in our Interfaith Community and to join us at our monthly meeting.
