

We Are Here For You

We have all heard the verse that begins...
"First they came for the Communists and I did not speak out because I was not a Communist"... then ... the Socialists... then ... the trade unionists... then ... the Jews.... Then they came for me, and there was no one left to speak out for me." This was written by a German Lutheran pastor named Martin

Niemöller, of the cowardice of German intellectuals and certain clergy following the Nazis' rise to power.

At its most basic level, it reinforces the message that we all need to be in this world for each other. When one group of people is denied their personhood, their freedom, their equality, then we all suffer. We suffer because we need the best of all of us to make the most of our time on this earth. And, more darkly, we suffer because when one group is repressed, we of the Jewish people are acutely aware that such repression of Jews is always just below the surface of our society. When the black population—or any segment of our community—is repressed, each of us has to find a way to push back on those evil messages and actions.

I'm proud that Jews in America have a history of standing up for the repressed. We have a long history of standing with our African

American friends, brothers, and sisters against the persecution that has been embedded in U.S. society for hundreds of years. I'm proud that even in our little corner of the world, Congregation Emeth has been a leader in the formation and advancement of the Interfaith Community of South County. We have always strived to step up to our responsibilities as members of our community. I know that we can and will continue to do so as individuals and as members of the Jewish people.

However, this charge seems to get more difficult all the time as we struggle to rise above all the challenges we've had to face recently. Mass shootings in our own community... ongoing security alerts.... an economic depression and massive unemployment... growing homelessness and displacement... wildfires destroying huge parts of the state and whole communities... a deadly virus ravaging the world and dramatically changing how we live our lives... a government unwilling or unable to step up to the challenges. Now, more than ever, I look to us, to our Congregation Emeth, for the strength, community, friendship, social contact, activities, and mutual support that is so necessary in this challenging moment of our lives. The Rachamim Phone Tree is reaching out each week to all our members; please let them or our Rabbi know if you need help in any way from the congregation.

Please, stay engaged, do what you can to support all members of our community, support each other, stay healthy, and know that Emeth is here to help and support you whenever you need us.


Congratulations to Our Graduates!

MEET EMETH'S NEW BOARD MEMBERS



MICHAEL OSHAN - PRESIDENT

I am one of the founding members of the South County Jewish Community (which became Congregation Emeth), and I have served as Board President during 3 previous terms, spread out

over the past 43 years. My children, now in their 40's, were raised Jewish in a family with only one Jewish parent, which is so typical of our membership. I was a single parent for about 7 years before I met the love of my life, Susan Meyers, and we recently celebrated out 27th wedding anniversary. We have a wonderfully compatible blended family which includes 4 adult children and 6 grandchildren.

I grew up in the San Fernando Valley when it was a semi-rural suburb of Los Angeles; my father was a barber and my mother was a part time Jewish kindergarten teacher in addition to raising me, my 3 sisters, and a brother. I moved to San Francisco in 1967 to attend San Francisco State University and have considered myself to be a Northern Californian since then. I hold a Masters in Rehabilitation Counseling and undergraduate degrees in Psychology and Business. In 1974, I was offered a job directing a small nonprofit agency in Gilroy which had a grant to provide drug abuse prevention services to an historically underserved population. We had a staff of three and, at that level, funding for about 1-2 years. While I initially thought Gilroy would be a brief interlude to my young career and new marriage, the agency grew under my direction: We were able to secure multiple funding sources, grew to a staff of over 50, and I stayed there for eight years as the Executive Director of what was then known as South County Alternatives. That organization merged with another nonprofit from Morgan Hill and is today operating as Community Solutions.

I left my role as Executive Director to become a full time house daddy for my 3- and 5-year-olds. That lasted about a year, and I then opened a private practice as a vocational rehabilitation counselor, working with a variety of people with disabilities. That practice also grew and supported my family for over 30 years; now I am basically retired. My wife, Susan, is also retired from a long career at SJSU where she was a professor and Dean of the College of Education.

I look forward to leading our membership at a positive transitional time when new leaders emerge and we continue to bond and build as a community.

A STELLAR YEAR FOR ADULT EDUCATION

Susan Braun, Adult Education Chair

Emeth offered three thought-provoking and well attended education series this past year. We were delighted with the interest in these classes and hope to build upon them in the upcoming year.

The series "Conundrums of the Bible" was taught by David Meir-Levi, whose impressive background in archeology, biblical studies, and history brought new and interesting perspectives to significant events in Jewish history. Topics included Creation, the Great Flood, and Exodus. The classes were so well received that we were able to add more classes addressing Origins and Development of Monotheism during the First Temple Period. There is an opportunity to continue another segment of the series, "The Rise and Fall of Monotheism", next year.

Another series, "Uppity Women of the Bible", was taught by Rabbi Debbie Israel. We examined several influential women in Jewish history including Heroines of the Exodus (Shifra, Puah, Bat Yam, and Miriam), Tamar, Delilah, Sarah, Rebekah, Eve and Lilith(who represents the spirit of darkness). It is clear that women have been a driving force in our history and culture. The class, over Zoom, was very well received and, including many of Rabbi's friends from Houston, averaged over 20 participants per class.

Our third and final series, "Jewish Ethics", was presented during Friday evening Shabbat services. The first presentation, on Medical Ethics, was by **Dr. Faith Protsman**. Her area of special interest is continuity of care, the life process and personal choice. The second, on Business Ethics, was presented by Emeth member, **Art Reide**l. He shared his views and knowledge about building and conducting successful businesses accompanied by moral and ethical methods. We hope to continue the Ethics series next year; possible topics include Legal and Political Ethics.

In addition, "Emeth Reads", our popular quarterly discussion group of books with a Jewish element, continues. All members are welcome. Finally, a big thank you to **all the parents** who, when their students were unable to attend Chai School with their teachers, supported their children's continued Jewish education at home.



SAFE PARK PROJECT Cathy & Stuart Gill

Emeth, along with our interfaith community, continue to be involved with the Safe Park program at the Morgan Hill Bible Church. This year we've taken meals to the church on Friday nights in January and May.

Many members of Emeth have participated, in this heart-warming act of *tzedakah*. Now, during shelter-in-place. there are families who need help more than ever. In the past, families could come in the evening for dinners and stay overnight, but they had to leave during the day. The program is now allowing families to stay on site 24 x 7 to help with the current situation.

We are very proud of what our congregation has done and continues to do, to support these families in need. In addition to providing meals on Friday nights we have stepped up our involvement in the following ways:

- Cathy Gill, in coordination with Susan Meyers, reached out to the interfaith community and found a much needed refrigerator to donate.
- We donated Target gift cards to each family member currently staying at Safe Park. The funds for these gift cards came from money paid for the Mah Jongg Tournament that had to be cancelled due to the shelter in place, a donation from Cathy and Pi Silverstein, and the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund.
- **Elizabeth Mandel** made face masks for the Safe Park families.

The Safe Park team has been extremely appreciative of our generosity and sends a big thanks to the congregation! We also want to recognize the families who participated in providing the Friday night meals in May: Freund-Foster, Andreadis-Meyers/Oshan, Mandel-Altman/Palm, Fishman/Wilner-Noodleman, and Gill with neighbors.

Case workers continue to track the success of the program and we are always thrilled to hear that a family, who was sleeping in their car or trailer, has moved into semi-permanent or permanent housing.

VOTER ENGAGEMENT: A New Challenge & A New Opportunity

The Jewish Council for Public Affairs

and the Religious Action Center of
Reform Judaism (RAC) provide the rationale and
support for congregations to become involved in the
National Reform Movement's 2020 Civic Engagement
Campaign "Every Voice Every Vote". They remind
us that "As Reform Jews, we believe democracy is
strongest when everyone participates—and it suffers
when citizens choose not to engage". The Every Voice
Every Vote Campaign is an example of nonpartisan
civic engagement work, an opportunity to fulfill the
sacred mandate of tikkun olam and ensure that our
enduring values are represented in the public square.

At our May meeting, in addition to reviewing our current projects with the "Safe Park" and St. Louise Hospital, members of the Tikkun Olam Committee participated in a preliminary discussion related to the challenge posed by the RAC to ensure that every member of our congregation has the information required to register to vote, and to vote safely as they exercise their right to vote.
