Celebrate Rabbi Dantowitz's Installation March 19

Shabbat Service of Installation for Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz Friday, March 19 at 7:00 PM

On Friday, March 19th, our community will come together to celebrate the installation of **Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz** as the Rabbi of Congregation Emeth.

Rabbi Dantowitz will be installed by colleague and friend, **Rabbi Mary Zamore**, Executive Director of the Women's Rabbinic Network. **Cantor Alisa Fineman** will join Rabbi Dantowitz to lead the service.

Prior to moving to California and becoming the spiritual leader of Congregation Emeth last summer, Rabbi Dantowitz served as a rabbi at Temple B'nai Abraham in Livingston, NJ for ten years. Earlier rabbinic work included being a Regional Director of Admissions and Recruitment at Hebrew Union College- Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR), the Reform Jewish movement's seminary, in NY and serving as a rabbi at Congregation B'nai Jeshurun in Short Hills, NJ.

Rabbi Mary L. Zamore is the Executive Director of the Women's Rabbinic Network, a partner organization of the Reform Movement. Founded in 1975, WRN works to narrow the wage gap, create safer, respectful Jewish communities, and promote equity for all. Rabbi Zamore is the co-leader of the Reform Pay Equity Initiative and heads WRN's Clergy: Safe Employees and Employers program, which focuses on a harassment-free Jewish community.

Alisa Fineman was ordained from The Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music at HUC-JIR in May of 2018, after having served Congregation Beth Israel in Carmel as Cantorial Soloist for 22 years. She began her cantorial path with Congregation Emeth in 1990 whose warmth and appreciation fueled her desire to become cantor.

Connecting Strongly Even in Challenging Times

Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz

Theologian Martin-Buber teaches about encounters as "I-It" or "I-Thou" experiences. An "I-It" encounter is a utilitarian one. "Please pass the water." "Please unmute yourself." An "I-Thou" encounter is experiencing the Divine in the moment. It is an authentic encounter. Perhaps you've experienced this in nature -- on a hike in the Redwoods, walking along the beach, at a loved one's simcha, or other occasions. It can happen between two individuals who sense God's presence

in their midst and it can happen on your own--where you feel God's presence.

In Genesis we read about our ancestor Jacob's experience with God when he states: "Surely God was in this place and I, I did not know it."

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I am now in my seventh month as Congregation Emeth's Rabbi and I have experienced multiple "I-It" and "I-Thou" encounters with you. The "I-It" pandemic moments are of course the lines we keep repeating: "Please mute yourself." "You're still on mute." "Your connection is unstable." "We lost him. Oh, he's back." "I can't hear you." "Please join in singing with me and be sure to stay on mute. I can see if your lips are moving."

The "I-Thou" encounters have been amazing. Leading my first High Holy Days with you--all on Zoom--I hoped that months of planning would help. In Judaism we learn about *keva* and *kavana*. *Keva* are fixed prayers. *Kavana* is the intention we bring to them. For example, we can recite *Shima* every day; sometimes it will feel more special than others.

God was in this place and I did recognize it. Not only on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur but in every encounter. From our one-on-one Zoom meetings to informal gatherings, Adult Learning, Chai School and Hebrew School classes — God is with us.

When I logged onto Zoom the first night of Chanukah for candle lighting and saw over three dozen screens, my heart soared. We have found a way to connect strongly even in this challenging time of the pandemic. And it's good to have our regular "I-It" encounters. They build connections too. We even come to expect whose cat will jump on someone, whose internet connection will be flaky, and who will forget to mute themselves.

As I mentioned in my first newsletter article, I am eager to get to know each of you and build relationships between us and one another in our sacred community. Congregation Emeth is a special place because of each of you. I am grateful to be your rabbi and look forward to many more encounters (I-It; I-Thou) on Zoom and one day, in person!

Chag Semeach, Happy Purim to you all. I sincerely hope that this newsletter finds you in good health and that you have been able to make the most of your time in these days of shut down. In most years, I find this to be my favorite season. The hillsides have turned green and the wildflowers are beginning to bloom, soon we will be celebrating Passover and our exodus from Egypt and slavery. We see a light at the end of the Covid-19 tunnel with people getting vaccinated and business beginning to re-open. Although our building sustained an isolated case of vandalism over the past month, the real damage was not to our physical building, but to our psyche. The good news is that we had a tremendous outpouring of support from our local community from various individuals and religious groups, which shows that the haters will not succeed in any effort to intimidate or dissuade us from our faith. In fact, I believe we are stronger as a result of the event. Be assured that we have good security and continue to enhance our current systems and surveillance.

As you may recall from my High Holiday address, my theme for the year is building *Kehillah*, Community. More specifically, *kehillah kedosha* or sacred community. Being part of the holy community means to take care of one another as well as ourselves. I believe, respecting and caring for others is the foundation of a holy community. I know many of our members appreciate that there has been a strong presence of community within Emeth even as we have had to close our synagogue doors during the past year. In preparation for the time when we will be able to return in person, many of you have been to our building to work on various projects around the facilities. This has included a remodel of our side entrance area to the building and sprucing up the sukkah and meditation garden. The library is being re-organized as well as the basement and attic areas. Upcoming projects include painting a mural on the concrete block shed in the parking lot and new planting in the front of the building. I am hopeful that we will be able to resume some live, in-person religious services within the next few months in our building with some added features. We are currently exploring the option of having services in our sanctuary which will be live streamed, so that when we do open up, there will still be an option to participate in a zoom format. Of course, this is subject to all appropriate social distancing regulations.

We no longer are renting out our building to a church on Sundays, though that could change as the situation progresses. We still have our kitchen rented to a caterer as we do need that income to assist with our usual expenses.

It is wonderful that so many of you have participated in our Rabbi-led Zoom services, and we thank Rabbi Dantowitz for her beautiful singing and spiritual guidance over this challenging year. This year we have also been blessed to be able to have Cantorial soloist and student-rabbi Mira Weller join us for some services and Cantor Alisa Fineman will be with us for several services this year. A few of our members have relocated to other States, but have continued to attend many of our on-line events. We also have several new families who have joined our Congregation during the shut down. I look forward to meeting all of the new members in person sometime in the near future. Our adult education and religious school have been well attended and praised for interesting programs.

I thank you all for continued financial support and appreciate the numerous hours of volunteer time that so many congregants have put in to keep our community going during these difficult times. If you have not yet had the opportunity to participate in the various programs that continue on-line, we encourage you to read about our activities in *HaMadrich* (our weekly bulletin). Online Learning with Amazing Teachers

This past year, our children have shown us what resilience means. One of our last in-person get togethers was last year's Purim Carnival. As we plan for this year's Purim events, the calendar shows that a year that felt like 10 years is almost complete. Many parents at the time wondered -- and probably still do -- how much virtual learning is too much? Can we ask our children (and parents) to go through virtual school all day and then attend virtual Hebrew or Chai school later that day? All of these wonders and concerns were considered, and with Rabbi Dantowitz and Marcia Fishman's help and leadership we were able to find a fantastic program and curriculum that would be able to carry us through an unknown period of virtual learning. Shalom Learning (shalomlearning.org) is an established online educational organization that allows our children to continue their journey through Jewish Values and Hebrew education virtually, with an easy transition back to in person learning when we decide the time is right. The silver lining in Emeth's virtual learning has been our introduction to some amazing educators that we would not have otherwise known. Our children and parents have had so many good things to say and share about the experience so far. Thank you to our teachers, our parents and our children for being resilient during the past year.

Chai School Values 1-2 grade and Chai School Values 3-4 grade:

Caleb Robinson (teaching from Philadelphia) is a rabbinical student at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York City. Before entering rabbinical school, he worked as a middle school librarian for Washington, DC public schools, and spent 12 years at the US Department of Labor working on veterans' employment and





employment-based immigration. Caleb hopes to work as a pulpit rabbi after graduation and is excited to be teaching our 1st through 4th grades! In his spare time, he enjoys reading and hiking.

Chai School Values 5-6 grade and support for EDK middle school age:

Rabbi Michelle Greenberg (teaching from Redwood City) is a talented educator with extensive experience working with young people in informal educational settings. Eytan Oren (teaching from Las Vegas) has worked in Jewish Education for 10+ years in many roles. The fundraising from the event enabled Sisterhood to purchase seating for Emeth's newly designed entryway and to donate to Second Harvest Food Bank.








EMETH READS... AND LEARNS TOGETHER

TIKKUN OLAM UPDATES

Your Emeth Tikkun Olam Committee is currently engaged in four projects:

Friday night dinners at Safe Park Congregation Emeth is committed to providing Friday night dinners for families living in the Morgan Hill Safe Park for the months of January and May 2021. The Safe Park is supported

by the Morgan Hill Police and City Council, members of the Interfaith CommUNITY of South County, and the Gilroy Compassion Center. Families living in their vehicles (cars and/or RVs) are vetted by the Morgan Hill Police before they are admitted to the Safe Park where they are permitted to live safely in their vehicles. There are washer/dryer facilities and family showers at the Safe Park and a common area where, before the COVID-19 precautions, families were encouraged to gather and visit with volunteers. A social worker from the Gilroy Compassion Center meets with each family, counseling them about appropriate social services, housing opportunities, and jobs to help them get back on their feet.

We look forward to inviting all Emeth members to participate in this important mitzvah in May when we take our turn to provide dinners for those in need at the Safe Park.

Shoes for those in need

Tikkkun Olam Committee members Cathy and Stewart Gill have been collecting shoes from local running clubs. These gently used shoes have been distributed to the Gilroy Compassion Center, St. Louise hospital and to Watsonville Hospital where our Emeth member Pamela Foster works as a social worker.

Affordable Housing

We are initiating a study related to local needs and to state legislation related to families who are unhoused. Thank you to **Jill Irwin** for taking the lead on this new project. The 2021 California State legislature has proposed several bills designed to begin to ameliorate the desperate need for affordable housing. We plan to keep our congregants informed as we learn more about this legislation.
