Purim Joy & Giving

Members of the congregation gathered to celebrate Purim in person and online with a variety of events. The activities featured games such as Gaga (or "Gaga Ball", a dodgeball like game played in a fenced-off "pit" popular in Israel and at Jewish summer camps) and Mahjong. Shabbat services featured a humourous retelling of the Purim story as well.

Our most notable activity was addressing the Purim Mitzvah of *matanot la-evyonim* — gifts for the poor — sponsored by the Tikkun Olam committee during the March 13th outdoor Purim Celebration. The committee's request for donations

of personal hygiene items to fill the bags was answered in a very big way, and an assembly line of helpers went into action at the event. Because of our efforts and donations, we provided 215 Mitzvah Gift Bags to the Compassion Center in Gilroy!

The kids also participated in our in-person Chai School Purim party/class on March 17th. **Rabbi Dantowitz** and **Cantor Alisa Fineman** led the first half of the afternoon event with some Purim prayers, songs and stories (including an Encanto parody of "We Don't Talk about Haman"), and then everyone participated in some fun carnival games. Thank you to the EDK class for assisting in setting up and putting the games away.

the online option for the foreseeable future. We have had a few successful in person events, a hike on the Coyote Creek trail, Purim activities, and several outdoor meetings with the youth programs.

As we ease back into full in-person participation, the Emeth Board is very conscious of on-going security issues that we must address for our members to feel safe. Safety from health concerns and the growing number of antisemitic threats that are prevalent these days have prompted our leadership to continue to enhance safety procedures. Over the next weeks you may be aware of an increase in our security surveillance system, and it is likely that we will be installing new security fencing around the building. We have had a professional security company provide us with a complete review of our property and we will be implementing a variety of upgrades. Most of these upgrades will not be noticeable to many of you, but I assure you that we are putting significant effort into making our facilities as safe as possible. When I was writing this article, Santa Clara County was still under a mandate to wear masks indoors. With that in mind we have purchased N-95 disposable masks which are available at the entrance to the building. We will continue to follow all County Health guidelines. At this time, masks are strongly advised but optional for all vaccinated individuals indoors.

Another development is that we once again are sharing our building with a compatible church tenant. The Morgan Hill Seventh Day Adventist Church will be holding Saturday services in our sanctuary on days that do not conflict with our own scheduled services and Jewish holiday activities. They will also have an evening program at our building on Wednesday evenings. This particular congregation is conducting their services mostly in Spanish. As of this writing they have used our facilities on two occasions and I am impressed at how conscientious they have been in respecting our property. They will be on a trial basis for now, but if all goes well it may be a long term relationship.

We have been treated to beautiful music and harmonies with **Rabbi Dantowitz** and **Cantor Alisa Fineman** over the past year; but alas, Cantor Fineman will be returning to her Congregation in Carmel Valley in next fiscal year, and we wish her well. We also have been lucky enough to have had our **Emerita Rabbi Israel** lead a service and it is a treat to be able to call on her when Rabbi Dantowitz has a conflict or is otherwise unavailable.

I continue to encourage our members to share Shabbat meals and to create small *chavurah* groups to enhance the Jewish experience of Emeth. My wife, **Susan Meyers**, and I frequently share Shabbat with others and it is always a pleasant evening. I hope to see you all at our upcoming programs and I wish you a happy springtime, my favorite time of the year.

Rabbi's Message

Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz

"For now the Winter has passed, the rains are over and gone, the blossoms appear on the earth, ...the song [of the turtledove] has come." -[Song of Songs 2:11]

After two long years of the pandemic, when the month of Adar arrived this year, we could relate differently to the Talmudic statement of the rabbis: *Mi shenichnas Adar marbim simcha*. When Adar enters, joy increases.

The January COVID surge has passed and there are more opportunities to safely join together. What a joy it was to celebrate Purim at the temple, including the pre-Purim party with 40 people there. Seeing kids and adults join together doing a mitzvah, playing games, enjoying hamentashen and simply enjoying one another's presence was uplifting. Lo, the Winter has passed—and we are emerging as a congregation—reconnecting with one another in person.

I'm eager to get to know each of you. What are your interests? How would you like to connect more with the congregation, with one another, with Judaism? I'll be reaching out to you and invite you to reach out to me as well.

Lo the Winter has passed, but the darkness still persists.

Our hearts are turned to the crisis in Ukraine. We are encouraging donations to the World Union for Progressive Judaism (WUPJ) and HIAS. A few of my NY colleagues traveled to Poland days before Purim to bear witness to this crisis. One friend, Rabbi David Wilfond, found his own relatives among the refugees—the mother, daughter and grandmother. The husband and son were not allowed to leave Ukraine. It was a bittersweet reunion to find family amidst millions of refugees and learn of their heartache. The women have since safely arrived in Israel.

How can we make a difference? We can make financial donations. We can send supplies with someone traveling to the area. We can lobby our elected leaders to help with refugees. We can help refugees in or near our own communities. We can think global and act local. Our Purim mitzvah—*matanot la'evyonim*—sending gifts to the poor—mitzvah bags for the homeless—was one of many ways we can help make even a small difference in our world.

As Passover approaches, we are reminded by the rabbis *B'chol dor vador chayav adam lirot et atzmo k'ilu hu yatza miMitzrayim*—In every generation we are to see ourselves as if we personally went from slavery to freedom. As we witness the tragedy in Ukraine, we think back to 80 years ago when our ancestors were slaughtered at the hands of the Nazis and ignored by bystanders. Today, when Ukranian refugees enter Poland they are welcomed by helpers from various faiths and nationalities, including Israel.

Yatza miMitzrayim—we are fortunate that most of us are not physically escaping from oppression and war. Yet, we recognize that we are all experiencing a 'going out' from "Mitzrayim"---narrow places.

After these past two years of the pandemic—we are emerging from constricted spaces—physically and emotionally. We will hopefully safely gather with family and friends for the most observed Jewish ritual—Passover Seder and sing with gusto, Dayeinu. It would have been enough.

If only God had brought us out of Egypt (narrow places), *Dayeinu*.

If only God had given us the Torah, Dayeinu.

If only God had helped us survive these years of the pandemic, *Dayeinu*.

If only God had enabled us to recognize the holy sparks in one another, *Dayeinu*.

as her adult children, Renee and Anthony joined us to share their mother's story and her perspective on today's political environment.





SHARING OURSELVES WITH THE OUTSIDE WORLD

What are our opportunities to create in our society a deeper bond of peoples with Judaism?

Rabbi Dantowitz had us meet with Sally Priesand the first female Rabbi, and she relayed a quite charming story from when she was a little girl and her father had requested her mom prepare a Passover dinner for an entire group of church nuns. And just recently, Rabbi Israel invited a member of the Interfaith community and her congregants to come study together King David's psalms!

Just a few weeks ago, I was invited by some local Methodists to see the TV program "The Chosen." I had never seen it, and barely heard of it. The comments as we were watching the episodes together helped me see that there is the need for more information to those outside of Judaism. The people attending had lots of questions, such as: "What were or are the beliefs about a coming Messiah? What does it mean to be involved in Jewish study? Are women allowed to also study as much? Can Rabbis be married? Why exactly do Jews create the tents?"

On the third session, a bread was brought out with the announcement, "Here is CHAllah!" It was pronounced as the "cha" in "cha,cha,cha dancing." I courteously corrected with the proper guttural sound, "challah" with a smile.

The prayers that are recited in the series and the themes are so similar to all practicing Judaism. The scenes even though that it was filmed in Utah provided a lively discussion of all of our trips to Israel and particularly Jerusalem, especially the Old City.

Friends, let us not miss an opportunity to pro-actively creating the world of care, respect and cooperation by letting and allowing others to have a deeper understanding of Judaism, by having an ideal to truly share... kinda reminding me of the song in "The King and I", "Getting to know you".

We've had a wonderful set of recent adult education programs! Including:

- Scouts, Trailblazers, Pathfinders, Explorers: After the honor of hosting America's first female
 Rabbi, Sally J. Priesand, in early October, we studied the impactful lives of significant women
 who held quasi-rabbinic status in their communities throughout history from the 1500's to
 modern times.

- The Jewish Studio Process, Led by Rabbi Margie Jacobs: We explored, created and played through conversation with each other and a facilitated text study, intuitive use of art materials, and a process of inquiry through writing.
- Experience Leonard Cohen: Thanks to Joyce Maskell we were able to take our first field trip in over two years to the Contemporary Jewish Museum in San Francisco to experience the music, poetry and impact of the late poet, singer, songwriter, and author Leonard Cohen through the eyes of three contemporary artists: George Fok (immersive audio-video collage), Judy Chicago (paintings on porcelain), and

Candice Breitz (larger than life video tribute.)

- Book of Psalms: Advent Lutheran Church and Congregation Emeth studied the Book of Psalms together. The Book of Psalms is a collection of 150 poetic prayers in the Bible representing complaint, thanksgiving praise, ethical rebuke to name a few. Rabbi Debbie Israel served as our guide through the history and "purpose" of psalms so that we could understand and appreciate their words.
- Eiluv'Eilu, These and Those: Exploring Polarization In A Time of Division, Led by Rabbi Schmiekin and Rabbi Dantowitz: Congregation Emeth partnered with One America Movement for this Adult Ed series on Polarization, focusing on Jewish texts teachings on division.
