## Religious School Updates

We're very excited to kick off the 2022-2023 religious school program. There are three parts of the program: Hebrew School (Grades 3 - B'nai Mitzvah), Chai School (K - B Mitzvah), and Emet Dor Kef (Post B Mitzvah). The first day of Hebrew School class will be Tuesday, October 11, 2022. The first day of Chai School will be Thursday, October 13, 2022.

Our congregation's religious school uses the ShalomLearning platform, a curriculum that was developed for both the virtual or in-person classroom. While it is creative, fun and forward thinking, the lessons provide a range of content from Jewish culture, history, and stories. The lessons are interactive and values-based, providing tenets that we all share, like "Using your inner strength to do what's right" and "Taking responsibility for your actions." It is engaging and innovative Jewish educational content, and it includes videos, text studies, blessings, and activities.

Younger grades experience each lesson using the five senses. As the grades progress, each of seven values (or units) consists of four lessons, incorporating social and emotional skills that enable students to build positive relationships and make responsible decisions. Through the values, students look at Jewish text, history, tefillah, and holidays.

## SECURITY TRAINING

We held Security training by Rafi Brinner from SF Jewish Community Federation on August 28. Morgan Hill Police Chief Shane Palsgrove attended as well and spoke at the beginning of the session. The training was attended by about two dozen people including a few from the Interfaith community. The Federation's community security training provides a roadmap for dealing with unexpected situations. The presentation and Q&A format covered how to maintain situational awareness, bring a security mindset to receiving visitors, and engage a run-hide-fight response when confronted with a worst-case scenario.

# Emeth Reads


The Emeth Reads book group had a wonderful discussion in June about a new book by Danny Adeno Abebe, *From Africa to Zion: The Shepherd Boy Who Became Israel's first Ethiopian -born journalist*. This is the extraordinary life story of Danny Adeno Abebe and his dangerous journey from Ethiopia, along with the truth, in all its painful complexity, about the Ethiopian experience in Israel, with Marcia Fishman as the well-organized conversation leader. In August, Emeth Reads had a terrific discussion of the book, *Becoming Eve: My Journey from Ultra-Orthodox Rabbi to Transgender Woman* by Abby Chava Stein, a transgender rabbi. Rabbi Dantowitz was happy to share texts from the Talmud about the six genders in Judaism as part of the discussion.

Our next book to read and discuss is the novel *Naamah* by Sarah Blake. The discussion will be led by **Elizabeth Mandel** on Wednesday, November 9th at 7:00 pm. Naamah was a New York Times best book of 2019 and a National Jewish Book Award Winner. The Washington Post offered this review comment: "An urgent feminist response to the Old Testament. . . . Blasphemous, carnal and committed to exaltation, Naamah delivers its truths in a torrent of heresies [and] dares us to center the experience and wisdom of women."

The group has also decided on the dates for next year: January 25, 2023, April 19, 2023, and June 28, 2023 and welcomes you to join them!

### SHARING OURSELVES WITH THE OUTSIDE WORLD








A group from Emeth joined the Bans off our Bodies Rally for reproductive rights in San Jose on May 14th.

## Adult Ed Highlights

### Susan Braun

This past spring Rabbi Dantowitz taught a class entitled "From Freedom to Responsibility." Each week we explored spiritual themes that emerge in the weekly Torah portion on our journey from Pesach to Shavuot. Sefirat HaOmer is the tradition to count the days (7 weeks) from Pesach to Shavuot. For each of the seven weeks, they teach, we should reflect on a particular personal quality. Each week, we should increase our capacity to express on that quality. The seven qualities are described using the language of the seven sefirot, seven qualities of God described in the *Zohar* (the "Big Book" of Jewish Mysticism).

WEEK ONE: *Chesed* — Lovingkindness. In practice: the ability to love others in a way that enables them to draw close to the Divine.

WEEK TWO: *Gevurah* — Strength of character. In practice: the personal resolve to make necessary personal sacrifices without faltering.

WEEK THREE: *Tiferet* – Glory. In practice: acting without ulterior motives.

WEEK FOUR: *Netzach* – Eternity. In practice: discerning what is of enduring importance in life.

WEEK FIVE: *Hod* – Splendor. In practice: pursing peace in every situation.

WEEK SIX: Yesod – Foundation. In practice: the moral commitment that is the foundation

for human social life.

WEEK SEVEN: *Malchut* – Sovereignty. In practice: rising to do what we have been appointed by God to do.

Upcoming Adult Learning opportunities include a Selichot program 9/17 (On Repentance and Repair) and a Yom Kippur Study session. Classes will begin after the holidays. Also, Rabbi Dantowitz encourages anyone interested in Adult B'nai Mitzvah to contact her.
