LEARNING ABOUT JEWISH REFUGEES IN SHANGHAI

An important piece of history shared with the community

On February 5th, Emeth hosted an event for the community to learn about the largely unknown story of the more than 20,000 stateless Jewish refugees that fled Nazi occupied Austria, Germany and Poland for Shanghai, China between 1933 and 1941. Over 150 people attended the sold-out event, which was organized by Emeth's Adult Education committee.

The event featured the curators of Holocaust Museum LA's recent exhibition, "Hidden History: Recounting the Shanghai Jewish Story," Jordanna Gessler, Vice President of Education and Exhibits, and Christie Jovanovic, Curator of Collections. Attendees were also able to meet Bay Area residents with connections to this piece of history, including 95-year old Shanghai survivor Renee Maimann Good. Special guest speaker former Congresswoman Jackie Speier told the audience about how she recently discovered that her grandfather, German-born Theodor Speier, had been imprisoned briefly in Nazi Germany's Buchenwald concentration camp, and that he and his son Manfred had sheltered as refugees in Shanghai during the Holocaust.

After the presentations and Q&A, participants were treated to a wonderful reception in the social hall featuring delicious baked goods prepared by members of Emeth's sisterhood and others.

A big thank you to everyone who helped to make this event such a success, and especially to **Joyce Maskell** for envisioning the program and putting so much effort into arranging for our amazing speakers and all the details of the event. Jordanna Gessler, noted after the event in a thank you email that, "I haven't stopped talking about what a wonderful, meaningful, inspiring event it was! The synagogue congregation is warm, giving, and represent the true meaning of community."

Karen Harris, a founding member of Congregation Emeth and our first treasurer, passed away on February 9th.

Although confined for over 20 years to a wheelchair and a small, shared space in a skilled nursing facility, Karen was an inspiration to all who knew her. She exuded intelligence, determination, and warmth.

Karen was a role model for all of us. While her physical condition left her unable to read and with limited mobility, Karen used every resource at her disposal to make her life as fulfilling as possible. This included

listening to the news and pushing her body to take advantage of limited occupational and physical therapy opportunities. She collected and cared deeply for friends: (Visitors to other residents would meet Karen, be drawn to her, and become her friend, continuing to visit her for years.) Karen practiced gratitude daily, celebrating small kindnesses that came her way as well as her friends and their successes.

Karen was an ardent feminist. Prior to her health problems, she had her own accounting business, and she told stories of the obstacles she encountered as a woman in the 70's getting a mortgage and a credit card. She could talk politics forever! One of the few disappointments she expressed was not being able to participate in the recent Women's Marches.

Karen was proud of her Judaism. She loved her family dearly and leaves behind a son Daniel and granddaughters Hannah and Samantha. She was a devoted older sister to brother Gary and sister Arlene. She will be missed by all who were blessed with her friendship.

Occasionally, I'll just close my eyes and consider "How are things going?" I know, that's a pretty general question. What things am I considering? And that, in itself, poses a problem. Because my assessment depends on whether I am zooming in or zooming out. (No, I'm not talking about the videoconferencing app.) If I zoom out and think about the world's challenges, it's very easy to get overwhelmed.

If I zoom out, I am easily overwhelmed: I had thought that the idea of a country initiating a war of conquest a concept left in history. Yet Russia is attempting exactly that.

I also see the ongoing impact of climate change without the necessary commitment across the world to take effective action. I see wildfires across the country to an extent previously unknown in our lifetimes, and have even had to evacuate my home not long ago due to an approaching wildfire.

I see that we have just lived through a pandemic that caused over one million deaths in our country alone, with deep division over how to respond to the crisis. And now, in this past week, I've seen earthquakes that have killed over 40,000 people.

It is so easy to get disheartened when I zoom out. However, then I zoom in....

I see that our state has taken concrete steps to address climate change, including widespread adoption of renewable fuel technologies, and Santa Clara county has the highest share of zero emission vehicles in the state.

Our county was the first in the nation to take aggressive steps in dealing with Covid and we have had one of the lowest Covid death rates of any large county in the country.

Our economy is still healthy, and the state of California is poised to be the fourth largest economy in the world when compared to all other countries. And if I zoom in further, I seen the quality of life in the South Valley continue to improve year after year with a great Morgan Hill community center, recreation center, aquatic center, soccer center, a local playhouse, a thriving and growing downtown, and solid educational opportunities for our kids.

Finally—if I zoom in one final time—I feel the warm and loving embrace of my personal family that is thriving and happy. And, I feel the love of my Congregation Emeth family: The emotional support of a wonderful Jewish community with inspiring religious services, engaging holiday activities in which to participate, wonderful educational opportunities such as the recent Shanghai Port of Refuge event, and a beautiful physical home, our synagogue, a blessing for a small yet thriving congregation.

So, when it's so easy to be overwhelmed with the world's challenges when my view is zoomed out, I just need to remember to zoom in to realize how much better the world really is and appreciate all my blessings. When I engage with the Congregation Emeth family, enjoy the activities, share time together at services, all these things give me energy and joy. I invite you all to do the same.

Learning that women with children are in need of tents and hygiene products, the remaining \$500 made it possible for us to purchase 8 tents for women and children and special hygiene packets for women in our community.

The tournament meets multiple objectives. First, our group of wonderful women -- Patty Baggese, Virginia Beck, Marcia Fishman, Nancy Fishman, Marilyn Freund, Cathy Gill, Janet Hopson, Jill Irwin, Susan Meyers, and Cheryl Thompson -- enjoy the process of planning and implementing the tournament together. Second, we appreciate this opportunity to welcome our guest players. Our Emeth warm hospitality has resulted in a wonderful, positive reputation for our Congregation. And finally, the tournament offers us an avenue for contributing to the needs of our congregation and our local community.
