TREE OF LIFE AWARD RECIPIENT: PETER MANDEL

Peter Mandel was presented with the 2023 Tree of Life Award at the annual meeting on June 25th. Peter has been an active member and leader of Congregation Emeth for over 15 years. He has served on the Board of Directors for at least 5 terms, including serving as President. This past year, Peter again stepped in to become interim President of the Congregation. He also spearheaded the drive to obtain the new torah which was dedicated on June 11 of this year. Additionally, Peter was the chair of the search committee which resulted in the hiring of **Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz**.

When we first bought our building, Peter was one of the Emeth members who volunteered many hours of service to assist us in the renovation of the building and he was one of the first investors in the Bond Campaign to fund the purchase of the building. He set up the theatrical lighting and has continued to be involved in the operation and upgrades in the sound system, security systems, and various tech related jobs at Emeth. Peter also used his theatrical talents to make our High Holiday program more interesting, as for several years he performed the Jonah and the whale story on Yom Kippur.

Rabbi's Message Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz

Dear Congregants,

Thirty years ago I was ordained a rabbi. Looking back over the decades, what I reflect on most is the power of sacred relationships. Whether I was delivering a sermon to thousands of people in my first congregation on the High Holy Days or thankful to welcome a *minyan* on Shabbat, part of the joy of being a rabbi is cultivating meaningful Jewish experiences while building relationships. Some happen when we expect them—such as a lifecycle event. Some happen unannounced—a student discovering how to read the word Sh'ma for the first time. Others involve putting our faith into action.

I am particularly proud of Reform Judaism welcoming LGBTQ+. I lived in NJ before Marriage Equality was legal in our country and lobbied for marriage equality at the State House multiple times, testifying before the legislators.

This June I've been thinking a lot about the LGBTQ+ community in celebration of Pride month and in recognition of the extremely challenging time facing so many in our country as many states have passed laws harming individuals. My colleagues in many states with transgender children are not able to access healthcare for their kids.

Why is this a Jewish issue? Well, we only need to look to the Torah Gen. 1:27 "And God created them in God's image; male and female God created them." Yes, in our Torah we see that the first human being was gender inclusive. Or as one meme I've recently seen says: God, the original They/Them.

Judaism's ancient texts—the *Mishna* and *Talmud*, over 2000 years old—also include multiple mentions of at least 6 genders in Judaism.

Congregation Emeth is a warm and welcoming community, affirming each individual created *B'tzelem Elohim*, in God's image. We celebrate Jewish families, intermarried families, individual members, LGBTQ+ families. With each individual, we have the opportunity to engage in sacred relationship.

Last summer we partnered with Cecelia's Closet to collect backpacks for their Back to School drive benefitting local students. In the fall, we organized the annual Canned Food Drive, the Every Voice Every Vote Campaign postcard drive, and spearheaded Morgan Hill Stands United Against Hate Week. In the winter, we created the auxiliary group called *Chaver*, for people who are "friends" of Tikkun Olam without wanting to be on the committee, and we now have six wonderful folks who we can call on to step up and help when we need them. We also collected donations for the Jewish Federation's Dreidel Board and provided Safe Park dinners in January. Then, more recently, we organized the

New Torah

Congregation Emeth is blessed to have recently acquired a third Torah scroll and we celebrate how we continue to add to the story of the Jewish people.

Years ago, the congregation bought a scroll in great condition and it was used for many years. It is a wonderful Torah but it is very heavy -- over 26 lbs without anything on it. About 10-15 years ago, the congregation, with **Rabbi Debbie Israel**'s help, purchased a lighter scroll (about 11 lbs) which is made up of rescued pieces of scrolls from the Holocaust. Unfortunately, this scroll's condition is no longer kosher and would require extensive repairs to stay kosher.

A few years ago, a donor stepped forward to make a significant gift and was happy to learn a Torah scroll was under consideration. Purchasing a Torah turns out to not be as simple as the online ordering we've all become used to. After searching through a variety of channels, we connected with a recently merged congregation in Ohio which had more Torahs than it would ever need. Former board member **Tracy Valentine** and her husband **Scott** had moved to Ohio and brought a scroll to Morgan Hill so we could get it evaluated.

Members of the ritual committee helped with this process including chair, Marby Lee, past chair Mel Weisblatt, Michael Oshan and then president Marcia Fishman.

The next step was finding a *sofer* or *soferet*, a scribe trained to write and/or repair Torah scrolls to evaluate and do the repairs. Rabbi Dantowitz found Rachel Jackson, part of an organization called STAM Scribes—all women *sofrot*. Rachel was visiting California from Massachusetts last Fall and examined our newly acquired scroll. In January, she did the needed work on it to make sure it was in an excellent condition for our usage.

After a successful fundraising effort, the congregation celebrated the new scroll and looks forward to using it for many years to come!

Did you know every Torah contains 304,805 letters which combine to a total of 79,976 words.

Rachel Jackson is a full-time scribe, bookbinder, designer, artist. She is a proud member of the Stam Scribes scribal collective. She notes in her bio that, until the early 2000s, this tradition was primarily relegated to men. However, in recent years there has been a small but growing cohort of female scribes—including herself—who fully embrace the *halachic* (ritual laws) of *sofrut* and are committed to opening it up to a wider range of practitioners and communities.

About the Interfaith CommUNITY of South County By Susan Meyers

Following the example of our local clergy interfaith group, 7 years ago Emeth led the way for the foundational meetings of what became our Interfaith CommUNITY of South County (ICSC). Together with our friends from 18 houses of worship in the Morgan Hill, Gilroy, Hollister area, we have gathered a group of people who are committed to creating compassionate communities through education, service, and social programs.

At the outset we agreed we wanted to learn about each other. That was the initiative for our "Faith of our Neighbors" program that offered each group the opportunity to host the program in their house of worship and teach about their faith traditions. It was just as important for us to celebrate all that we share in common. So, we participated in the annual 4th of July Parade in Morgan Hill, and we host annual events at Thanksgiving and Martin Luther King Day.

The ICSC provides service through our partnerships with the Gilroy Compassion Center and the Morgan Hill Edward Prado Foundation. We share the value of "*tikkun olam*" and *rachamim* as we provide dinners for those unhoused, clothing, school supplies and hygiene kits. Service to our community extends as we demonstrate our values related to creating peace and understanding in our South County towns. We introduced the national

"Standing up Against Hate" movement, bringing Morgan Hill into the national light through posters and programs that promote peace and understanding.

Once we were safely able to meet in person, we brought back our annual spring picnic. This social scene brought people together from the 18 participating houses of worship. With space limited to 125 people, each group was limited to 10 representatives. Once again, Emeth led the group with Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz there to share a blessing before the meal. The ICSC Steering Committee meets monthly. Our meetings always include an opportunity for learning, introducing new ideas and appreciating the opportunity to engage in building friendships and nurturing our commitment to creating compassionate communities. **Rick Coencas** and I have been attending these meetings throughout the last 7 years. CONGREGATION EMETH CODE OF ETHICS By Susan Meyers

Why an Emeth "Code of Ethics"?

Congregation Emeth is part of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ). As a member congregation, our Board of Directors receives guidance from the URJ. This year, after exploring the URJ rational for each Reform Congregation to approve a "Code of Ethics", our Emeth Board reviewed the recommendations and designed a "Code of Ethics" that supports the warm and inclusive culture that is "Emeth."

The Emeth Code of Ethics is presented in three parts:

Part One: An introduction and rationale for the Code of Ethics.

Part Two: The Code sets forth the principles and expectations for adherence to standards of conduct for our clergy, congregants, staff, visitors and guests, whether participation in an Emeth activity that is in the building, online or off-site.

The five components of the Code are clearly related to our Jewish values, as follows:

- Exemplify Holiness (*K'Dushah*) Congregation Emeth welcomes all who wish to engage with our sacred community.
- Honesty (*Yosher*) Congregation Emeth expects all who engage in our community to conduct themselves in an honest manner
- Honor (*Kavod*) Congregation Emeth values acting with integrity
- Compassion (*Rachamim*) Congregation Emeth embraces the fundamental value of performing acts of lovingkindness (*g'milut chasadim*)
- Justice (*Tzedek*) Congregation Emeth believes everyone entering our sacred space has the right to feel safe and respected.

Part Three: Addressing Allegations of Unethical Behavior

Procedures are delineated to guide Emeth leadership (Rabbi and Congregation President) if there is a need to respond to incidents of unethical behavior.

The entire Emeth Code of Ethics will be published on our Congregation Website.

- *Mussar* Series-Beginning in October on alternate Thursdays (afternoon or evening, tbd) What is *Mussar*? It is a virtue based ethics/Jewish spiritual practice based on *Middot*-values. *Tikkun Middot* is the idea of cultivating our inner virtues to work on our own repair. There are numerous middot and this learning requires practice. For example, if the middah we explore is judgment, it would mean evaluating how you do during the day judging others/judging yourself.

The learning includes Jewish text sources, mindfulness practice, journaling, personal reflection and conversation/sharing. Ideally, each person is paired with another student for 'check-in' over the course of the weeks between class sessions.


