Previous theater outings had included *The Outsider* and *Becky's New Car* at Limelight by SVCT.

Rabbi's Message Rabbi Faith Joy Dantowitz

Dear Congregants,

Anticipation. Since October 7th I wondered when I would be able to return to Israel. After a month, I learned from colleagues in Israel that they were grateful for visitors. It is something we can do to show support. Bearing witness. *Bikur Holim* – visiting the sick. *Nihum Avelim* – comforting the mourner.

When physically able, the ability to show up in person speaks volumes. The power of presence was one of the most important aspects of my visit to Israel at the end of January/beginning of Friday on a Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) Solidarity mission with 35 Reform Rabbis. Each hug; each hello; each thank you; was a moment of support and connection. My week in Israel was an extended *shiva* call to a traumatized and transformed country. A sweet highlight was meeting Sarah Langerman who grew up at Congregation Emeth and made aliyah a few years ago. She lives in Jerusalem and works for MASA.

I witnessed the magnificent resilience of Israelis. Everyone is involved in supporting others. As Reform Rabbis, it was especially meaningful to offer our support to our Israeli colleagues, spiritual frontline providers. Rabbi Yael Vurgan is the rabbi of ten communities in the Gaza Envelope which suffered unspeakable horrors, murders, sexual violence and kidnapping.

Survivors from one of the Kibbutz Nahal Oz spoke with us at their temporary home of Kibbutz Mishmar HaEmek. My heart was in my throat as Naomi spoke about her family's experience as terrorists raided her kibbutz. They shot at their front door which jammed the lock—perhaps saving their lives. While hiding in their safe room they emptied their kids' toy box, since they could not use an actual bathroom. She is not sure if she will ever feel comfortable going back home.

My colleagues and I bore witness to the pain of the hostage families. I bore witness to friends with children serving in the IDF in Gaza. We listened to the pain of Israeli society—not knowing when this War will end—what is victory—how to ensure safety for Israelis and how to end the pain of War for thousands under Hamas' control in Gaza.

Rabbi Gilad Kariv, the first Reform Rabbi to be a Member of the Knesset spoke with us and emphasized that the situation is much bigger than Hamas-existential threat (the Iranian alliance). We saw in April with Iran's missile attack, that the support of allies was critical for Israel's safety. He shared that Israeli leaders must be brave enough and strong enough to admit they can not do this by themselves. He pushed back against the false stories from Prime Minister Benjamin "Bibi" Netanyahu and others who say this is a binary situation: Hamas or Israelis. (cont)

Rabbi Kariv shared that while we know the huge challenges of a corrupt Palestinian Authority, "we are not trying to create a heaven – we are asking us what can be done down here on earth. None of the Western governments or other Arabic regimes are going to do the work of rebuilding Gaza."

There is so much pain.

Upon returning home from Israel, I found our community faced with Ceasefire resolution proposals in both Morgan Hill and Gilroy City Councils. When I shared this news with my friends in Israel they were perplexed and asked: do we have resolutions about every country in the world? Are we experts on Middle East peace—will a resolution change what is happening there—no—but I am seeing how the process caused more pain in our community. Many Emeth members were at these painful meetings. It is not an overnight solution, but I'm grateful that Rabbi Debbie Israel, Imam Ilyas Anwar, and I are working together with our Interfaith colleagues on healing. City Council members responded they are eager to be part of the healing too.

This poem, From the place where we are right, by Israeli poet Yehuda Amichai urges up to open our hearts to one another.

From the place where we are right Flowers will never grow In the spring.

The place where we are right Is hard and trampled Like a yard.

But doubts and loves Dig up the world Like a mole, a plow. And a whisper will be heard in the place Where the ruined House once stood.

RABBI IN DC

Rabbi Dantowitz was honored that the American Jewish World Services (AJWS) brought her to Washington DC for a powerful advocacy gathering mid-March. Together with eight other colleagues and AJWS staff, she lobbied on Capitol Hill and met with individuals from the National Security Council.

Rabbi noted that as part of the trip, "We acknowledged in each office that our hearts continue to ache over the War in Gaza and that we are also called, as Jews, to stand up for justice everywhere."


